GRADUATE STUDIES (CONTINUED)

Students at Canadian universities are frequently involved in rewarding research opportunities, often during their early undergraduate years. Students can expect to be in close contact with world-class researchers who are engaged in cutting edge work within their respective fields and who see research as an integral component to their classroom teaching. As an international graduate student in Canada, you can offer your unique knowledge and ideas to projects that will contribute directly to the world.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS

There are a number of scholarship and award programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels designed to provide opportunities for students of foreign countries to pursue research and studies in Canada. These programs are offered through the federal and provincial governments as well as non-governmental foundations and individual universities.

The federal government offers scholarship programs for graduate students such as the Canada Graduate Scholarships (CGS) program that supports 2,500 master's and 2,500 doctoral students annually. As well, the Georges Philias Vanier Canada Graduate Scholarships, introduced in 2008, supports 500 Canadian and international doctoral students annually with grants worth \$50,000 per year for up to three years.
